Course Description

This course will introduce you to the History of Western Art through a close examination of works found in the rich collections of the museums in Paris. Emphasis will be placed on understanding artworks within their original cultural and historical contexts, paying particular attention to questions of production, reception, ideology, and patronage. Students will develop an understanding of the methods of visual analysis, as well as artistic style and development. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify major works in Parisian museums and the philosophical, religious, and cultural contexts that produced them; describe the chronological development of art and its concerns; demonstrate an ability to use appropriate art historical terminology, and be able to interpret the meaning of works of art based on their visual properties and original contexts.

Course Learning Outcomes

Recognition of major masterpieces in Parisian museums.

Establishing historical chronology.

Ability to describe and analyze works of art and to identify their style-periods and cultures. Mastery of art-historical terminology.

Course Outline

Classes:

Each week will be dedicated to the study of a major art historical period and geographical region from antiquity to the modern era by focusing on a select number of works. The course has weekly reading assignments from your textbook *Gardner's Art Through the Ages*. You are expected to come to each class meeting having done the assigned reading, as well as to ask questions and engage in discussion to strengthen your understanding of the material. Come prepared to take notes with a pen/pencil and notebook.

Attendance Policy

Assessment:

Short Writing Assignments

Each short writing assignment asks you to select one work of art from a collection in Paris and reflect on the ways in which the work both fits and departs from the works and themes we covered that week. You will use newly learned art historical terminology and observe key elements of a work of art such as subject, iconography, medium, composition, use of line and color.

Midterm and Final Exam

The exams are non-cumulative and will be a combination of slide ID, compare and contrast, and short answer essay questions. Testable material includes lectures and readings.

Final Research Paper

I will provide you with a list of possible paper topics – these will be objects from the local collections in Paris. The paper consists of two key parts: an opening, in which you describe the object and identify a problem that the work raises, and the body of the paper, which constitutes your sustained analysis of the object in response to the problem you identified. I will give out the grading rubric for the paper before it is assigned.

Participation

Attendance and participation are expected at all class meetings. Your participation grade will be based on your active involvement in class discussion. Attendance is key to your success in the course.

Punctuality

This course is held almost exclusively in museums and the time for a group visit is limited. It is therefore essential that you come on time. Always check the syllabus for the exact time and meeting place. If you are late it will be up to you to get in and catch up with the group. The group won't wait for latecomers. In case of an issue, send me an email prior to the meeting time. Keep in mind that I will not be able to see your email once the class has started. The course is arranged so that students who have class at AUP before or after have enough time to commute.
